3. What is the most surprising thing about g_d's request that Abraham sacrifice Isaac to the people of that time? How is the story of Isaac and Rebekah similar to that of Abraham and Sarah?
4. Describe the relationship between Esau and Jacob. Why does Isaac, in the end, make Jacob his heir? How does this conflict with later Jewish law.
5. Explain how and why Jacob's name changed. Why does Esau eventually accept Jacob's place in the family?
6. Explain the importance of Rachel to the Patriarchy and the history of Judaism.
